#### People of the Promise: Gideon, Part 2: Pitfalls of Success Judges 8

#### Introduction

Last time our study of Gideon taught us that little is much when God is at work.

So because the Lord empowered him and fought for Israel, Gideon achieved phenomenal success. He would be a judge over Israel for 40 years. During that time the nation would enjoy peace. It's natural for us to want to achieve success in our lives—doing well in school, marrying the man or woman of our dreams, landing a great job, rising to a high level in our career, growing a happy family. It is not uncommon to find out that we enjoyed the anticipation of these achievements more than the actual accomplishment of them. In some areas, we fall short of what we thought we would achieve. In others we succeed well, but find success doesn't really satisfy us the way we thought it would. *With success come opportunities. But with success come temptations and dangers we never had to face before.* 

Gideon illustrates this principle well. The Pitfalls of Success.

You could walk away from tonight's study feeling of cynical and depressed. "No matter how well we do, life's not going to turn out well." But that misses the point of what the Scripture presents to us here.

We need to remember **first** that **the greatest blessings of all come when God is at work in our lives.** He doesn't need us to be successful people. He has granted to us a life of His grace poured out on us.

# Second, we must not fix our hopes—our heaven as it were—on our successes.

#### Judges 8

They are not all they're cracked up to be and they often come with a price tag. We are a broken people in a broken world, and until God brings the new heaven and new earth, our successes will not free us from all the difficulties of living in this sin-cursed world.

Third, we need to learn to enjoy the blessing of serving God by loving Him and loving others no matter what the ups and downs of our life journey brings.

And fourth, we need to watch out for the special temptations that come with success. We don't want our blessings to end up harming others and ourselves just because we weren't being watchful of the Pitfalls of Success.

### 1. Jealousy (1-3)

<sup>1</sup> Then the men of Ephraim said to him, "What is this that you have done to us, not to call us when you went to fight against Midian?" And they accused him fiercely. <sup>2</sup> And he said to them, "What have I done now in comparison with you? Is not the gleaning of the grapes of Ephraim better than the grape harvest of Abiezer? <sup>3</sup> God has given into your hands the princes of Midian, Oreb and Zeeb. What have I been able to do in comparison with you?" Then their anger against him subsided when he said this.

### 2. Disloyalty (4-12)

<sup>4</sup> And Gideon came to the Jordan and crossed over, he and the 300 men who were with him, exhausted yet pursuing. <sup>5</sup> So he said to the men of Succoth, "Please give loaves of bread to the people who follow me, for they are exhausted, and I am pursuing after Zebah and Zalmunna, the kings of Midian." <sup>6</sup> And the officials of Succoth said, "Are the hands of Zebah and Zalmunna already in your hand, that we should give bread to your army?" <sup>7</sup> So Gideon said, "Well then, when the LORD has given Zebah and Zalmunna into my hand, I will flail your flesh with the thorns of the wilderness and with briers." <sup>8</sup> And from there he went up to Penuel, and spoke to them in the same way, and the men of Penuel answered him as the men of Succoth had answered. <sup>9</sup> And he said to the men of Penuel, "When I come again in peace, I will break down this tower."

<sup>10</sup> Now Zebah and Zalmunna were in Karkor with their army, about 15,000 men, all who were left of all the army of the people of the East, for there had fallen 120,000 men who drew the sword. <sup>11</sup> And Gideon went up by the way of the tent dwellers east of Nobah and Jogbehah and attacked the army, for the army felt secure. <sup>12</sup> And Zebah and Zalmunna fled, and he pursued them and captured the two kings of Midian, Zebah and Zalmunna, and he threw all the army into a panic. Don't think that a successful start will mean everyone else buys in. Not everyone will have the same vision and boldness you do. Sometimes you have to push on without their support.

### 3. Revenge? (13-21)

<sup>13</sup> Then Gideon the son of Joash returned from the battle by the ascent of Heres. <sup>14</sup> And he captured a young man of Succoth and questioned him. And he wrote down for him the officials and elders of Succoth, seventyseven men. <sup>15</sup> And he came to the men of Succoth and said, "Behold Zebah and Zalmunna, about whom you taunted me, saying, 'Are the hands of Zebah and Zalmunna already in your hand, that we should give bread to your men who are exhausted?'"

<sup>16</sup> And he took the elders of the city, and he took thorns of the wilderness and briers and with them taught the men of Succoth a lesson. <sup>17</sup> And he broke down the tower of Penuel and killed the men of the city.
<sup>18</sup> Then he said to Zebah and Zalmunna, "Where are the men whom you killed at Tabor?" They answered, "As you are, so were they. Every one of them resembled the son of a king." <sup>19</sup> And he said, "They were my brothers, the sons of my mother. As the LORD lives, if you had saved them alive, I would not kill you." <sup>20</sup> So he said to Jether his firstborn, "Rise and kill them!" But the young

man did not draw his sword, for he was afraid, because he was still a young man. <sup>21</sup> Then Zebah and Zalmunna said, "Rise yourself and fall upon us, for as the man is, so is his strength." And Gideon arose and killed Zebah and Zalmunna, and he took the crescent ornaments that were on the necks of their camels.

Some interpreters charge that Gideon carried out punishment against the inhabitants of Succoth beyond the crime, and that with Zebah and Zalmunna, he was engaging in personal revenge. Others argue that Gideon was only carrying out justice.

The very fact that there's a question suggests that one of the difficulties of successful leadership is hard choices that leave people divided on whether you did the right thing. Power often leads to misuse, and if not misuse, criticism.

### 4. Idolatry—misused wealth and usurping one's place (22-28)

<sup>22</sup> Then the men of Israel said to Gideon, "Rule over us, you and your son and your grandson also, for you have saved us from the hand of Midian." <sup>23</sup> Gideon said to them, "I will not rule over you, and my son will not rule over you; the LORD will rule over you." <sup>24</sup> And Gideon said to them, "Let me make a request of you: every one of you give me the earrings from his spoil." (For they had golden earrings, because they were Ishmaelites.) <sup>25</sup> And they answered, "We will willingly give them." And they spread a cloak, and every man threw in it the earrings of his spoil. <sup>26</sup> And the weight of the golden earrings that he requested was 1,700 shekels of gold, besides the crescent ornaments and the pendants and the purple garments worn by the kings of Midian, and besides the collars that were around the necks of their camels. <sup>27</sup> And Gideon made an ephod of it and put it in his city, in Ophrah. And all Israel whored after it there, and it became a snare to Gideon and to his family. <sup>28</sup> So Midian was subdued before the people of Israel, and they raised their heads no more. And the land had rest forty years in the days of Gideon.

And ephod was a tunic the priest would wear. Gideon's success led to misappropriating the priest's office to himself and to Israel idolizing the golden ephod. Neither would have been possible apart from Gideon's victories and the wealth it brought him. He was so popular the people wanted to make him king. He wisely refused their request, but then turned around and misused his power, wealth, and popularity.

#### 5. Indulgence (29-31)

<sup>29</sup> Jerubbaal the son of Joash went and lived in his own house. <sup>30</sup> Now Gideon had seventy sons, his own offspring, for he had many wives. <sup>31</sup> And his concubine who was in Shechem also bore him a son, and he called his name Abimelech.

Gideon's actions are completely in line with how ancient kings lived but completely out of line with God's directives to Israel's leaders in Deuteronomy 17. After he had refused the kingship, he lived like a king and thought of himself as king—as evidenced by his naming his son born of a concubine in Shechem Abimelech—"my father is king."

# 6. Apostasy (32-35)—Leaders are mortal; their successes short-lived.

<sup>32</sup> And Gideon the son of Joash died in a good old age and was buried in the tomb of Joash his father, at Ophrah of the Abiezrites. <sup>33</sup> As soon as Gideon died, the people of Israel turned again and whored after the Baals and made Baal-berith their god. <sup>34</sup> And the people of Israel did not remember the LORD their God, who had delivered them from the hand of all their enemies on every side, <sup>35</sup> and they did not show steadfast love to the family of Jerubbaal (that is, Gideon) in return for all the good that he had done to Israel.

It's hard for us when those who led us well pass on. But it's good for us to remember that our hope is not in mortal men, however successful, but in the living God whose kingdom is forever.
