## August 5, 2012 "Born to Be Great, but Not the Greatest" Luke 1:57-80

<sup>15</sup> Now as the people were in expectation, and all reasoned in their hearts about John, whether he was the Christ *or* not,

<sup>16</sup> John answered, saying to all, "I indeed baptize you with water; but One mightier than I is coming, whose sandal strap I am not worthy to Ioose. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. (Luke 3:15-16 NKJ)

## I. The greatness of John the Baptist is indisputable, and was evident even from his birth –

1. John's birth was a "great mercy" to Elizabeth

Now Elizabeth's full time came for her to be delivered, and she brought forth a son.<sup>58</sup> When her neighbors and relatives heard how the Lord had shown great mercy to her, they rejoiced with her. (Luke 1:57-58 NKJ)

- A. She had been barren
- B. She was well past child bearing years
- *C.* Giving birth at her age was considered a great mercy from God and like a miracle
- D. Not having children was a shameful thing to women, the birth of John took away her reproach -

NKJ Luke 1:7 But they had no child, because Elizabeth was barren, and they were both well advanced in years.

 $^{24}$  Now after those days his wife Elizabeth conceived; and she hid herself five months, saying,  $^{25}$  "Thus the Lord has dealt with me, in the days when He looked on *me*, to take away my reproach among people." (Luke 1:24-25 NKJ)

NKJ Luke 1:36 "Now indeed, Elizabeth your relative has also conceived a son in her old age; and this is now the sixth month for her who was called barren. "For with God nothing will be impossible." (Luke 1:37 NKJ)

2. John's circumcision and naming coincided with the recovery of Zacharias and caused people to marvel, fear and question "what kind of child will this be?"

<sup>59</sup> So it was, on the eighth day, that they came to circumcise the child; and they would have called him by the name of his father, Zacharias.

<sup>60</sup> His mother answered and said, "No; he shall be called John."

<sup>61</sup> But they said to her, "There is no one among your relatives who is called by this name."

<sup>62</sup> So they made signs to his father-- what he would have him called.
<sup>63</sup> And he asked for a writing tablet, and wrote, saying, "His name is John." So they all marveled.

<sup>64</sup> Immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue *loosed*, and he spoke, praising God.

<sup>65</sup> Then fear came on all who dwelt around them; and all these sayings were discussed throughout all the hill country of Judea.

<sup>66</sup> And all those who heard *them* kept *them* in their hearts, saying, "What kind of child will this be?" (Luke 1:59-66A)

3. John's greatness from birth onward, even from before his birth, was due to the fact God was with him –

And the hand of the Lord was with him. (Luke 1:66B)

- II. Yet, as great as John the Baptist was, even his father knew, even from the start, John's greatness was a secondary, inferior and dependent greatness, notice the Christ centered nature of Zacharias' praise and prophecy –
- 1. Zacharias' first words, having a newly restored voice were words in praise of God –

Immediately his mouth was opened and his tongue *loosed*, and he spoke, praising God. (Luke 1:64 NKJ)

2. His Spirit inspired prophecy was first about God and the redemption / salvation which would be provided by Christ -

Now his father Zacharias was filled with the Holy Spirit, and prophesied, saying: <sup>68</sup> "Blessed *is* the Lord God of Israel, For He has visited and redeemed His people, <sup>69</sup> And has raised up a horn of salvation for us In the house of His servant David, <sup>70</sup> As He spoke by the mouth of His holy prophets, Who *have been* since the world began, <sup>71</sup> That we should be saved from our enemies And from the hand of all who hate us, <sup>72</sup> To perform the mercy *promised* to our fathers And to remember His holy covenant, <sup>73</sup> The oath which He swore to our father Abraham: <sup>74</sup> To grant us that we, Being delivered from the hand of our enemies, Might serve Him without fear, <sup>75</sup> In holiness and righteousness before Him all the days of our life. (Luke 1:67-75 NKJ)

A. Note the Spirit will direct us to put God and Christ first

- B. Note Christ is spoken of in terms of redemption and salvation 68-69
- C. Note Christ is spoke of as a horn, symbol of government and power :69
- D. As a Horn of Salvation because He would use that power to save us :69
- *E.* Christ and these themes were the focus of all God's prophets and promises :70-74
- *F.* The purpose of our salvation being our service and relationship with God :75
- G. Just like Mary and Elizabeth, the Spirit raises Zacharias also to this high level of Praise, prophecy and purpose focused on Christ –
- III. Yet, this Heavenly focus was not adverse to earthly duty, Zacharias' son John had a calling from birth and at eight days Zacharias had the privilege of commissioning / charging young John with that call
- 1. Note the direction of this call / commission -

"And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Highest; for you will go before the face of the Lord to prepare His ways, (Luke 1:76 NKJ)

He speaks directly to his young son John, eight days old, why?

- (1) He would start with this child early, preparing him for this High Calling!
- (2) John had responded to Mary's greeting, even while in the womb, he would not underestimate Spirit empowered understanding!
- (3) He and his wife were old, who knew how much time they had left to influence their young son, they would REDEEM the time as the days were evil!
- (4) His son's calling was an exceedingly high calling, and being Spirit filled Zacharias felt / knew the importance and weight of such a calling!
- 2. Note the content of this call / commission –

"And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Highest; For you will go before the face of the Lord to prepare His ways, <sup>77</sup> To give knowledge of salvation to His people By the remission of their sins, <sup>78</sup> Through the tender mercy of our God, With which the Dayspring from on high has visited us; <sup>79</sup> To give light to those who sit in darkness and the shadow of death, To guide our feet into the way of peace." (Luke 1:76-79 NKJ)

- Prophet of the Highest meant Prophet of God; "THE" prophet of the Highest indicates that John would uniquely be such a prophet
- *He was to be the forerunner of Christ, preparing His way:*
- (1) He would provide knowledge
- (2) Give good news about the remission of sin
- (3) About God's tender mercy
- (4) About Christ as "the Dayspring from on High"
- (5) Providing Light
- (6) Guiding feet to the way of peace

## *IV.* See John's preparation for this calling –

## So the child grew and became strong in spirit, and was in the deserts till the day of his manifestation to Israel. (Luke 1:80 NKJ)

- 1. His maturation both physically and spiritually was a process
- He was taken to and or sought out the solitude of the desert (A.)A high calling requires a great deal of time alone with God

(B.) Paul had a similar desert experience at the beginning of his conversion and call –

<sup>15</sup> But when it pleased God, who separated me from my mother's womb and called *me* through His grace,

<sup>16</sup> to reveal His Son in me, that I might preach Him among the Gentiles, I did not immediately confer with flesh and blood,

<sup>17</sup> nor did I go up to Jerusalem to those *who were* apostles before me; but I went to Arabia, and returned again to Damascus.

<sup>18</sup> Then after three years I went up to Jerusalem to see Peter, and remained with him fifteen days.

<sup>19</sup> But I saw none of the other apostles except James, the Lord's brother. (Gal 1:15-19 NKJ)

(C.) Even Jesus had a somewhat similar preparation – Matthew 4:1-11
