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- 2. Know that being embodied is a good thing.

That's why the apostles repeatedly stressed Christ's body: that in him 'all the fullness of the Deity lives in bodily form' (Col. 2:9), that he 'bore our sins in his body on the cross' (1 Pet. 2:24)....John even says the crucial test of orthodoxy is to affirm that Jesus has 'come in the flesh' (1 John 4:2)."
