Do you know in your head – and “feel” in your bones – that the Psalter is all about Jesus? Your theological background will have a lot to do with this, but it is essential that you view the Psalter as Jesus and his Apostles did. They sang from it weekly (likely daily), based their theology in it, and advocated for its singing in both Jewish (Jas. 5:13) and Gentile settings (Eph. 5:19; Col. 3:16).
