Abiding – Effortless or Energized?

John 15:5b – "...w/o Me you can do nothing."

Reading: 2 Peter 1:1-11

Bethany Baptist Church August 20, 2017 (p.m.) ...pray...

Read text – John 15:1-11.

John 15 begins with Jesus' allegory of the vine & branch & the vinedresser.

We've already harvested some key truths from Jesus' illustration:

We are *commanded* to abide in Christ (4).

We bear **NT** fruit as we abide (4,5; e.g., of Spirit, good works, evangelism, answered prayer).

We are *sanctified* (pruned) as we abide (2); but *judged* if we won't (2, 6).

We glorify God as we abide  $(8, \rightarrow bear fruit)$ .

We gain assurance as we abide (8; again, bear fruit).

We experience Christ's *love* as we abide (9-10).

We experience joy as we abide (11)!

Underlying all of this & the crux of Jesus' message is simply this: "Abide in Me."

V.4 – Abide in Me & I in you; unless you abide in Me

V.5 - He who abides in Me & I in Him

V.6 – If anyone does **not** abide in Me

V.7 – If you abide in Me; if My words abide in you

V.9 – abide in My love

V.10 – (again) abide in My love

That's it! "Abide in Me."

Abiding in your Savior is a fundamental aspect of the fruitful Christian life.

But *how...*?

Let's begin by wrestling with a John 15 question that sincere Christians have wrestled with for hundreds of years: "Is 'abiding' me doing nothing while God does everything?"

- 1. We've all read it on the posters in the Christian bookstore: "Let go & let God!" That poster has been around forever... ☺
- 2. To be more historically precise, we could rewind back to 17<sup>th</sup> century France & the life & writings of Madame Guyon (contemporaries).
  - a. Madame Guyon was a Roman Catholic mystic who advocated a philosophy that church history knows as  $quietism (\rightarrow quiet)$ .
  - b. Simply defined as "withdrawing from activity in the spiritual life in order to allow God to work."  $\rightarrow$  I am quiet; God is at work.
    - i. That sounds *spiritual*, it certainly appeals to *some personalities*.
    - ii. Is quietism biblical? Is the abiding life a spiritually sedentary life of just letting go & simply letting God?
  - c. Practically speaking, it *doesn't* work too well! You can't *trek* the *narrow way* without picking up your backpack & *moving forward*.
    - i. As we'll examine more carefully in a few minutes, Jesus had a lot to say (incl. John 15) about *doing* while *abiding*.
  - d. In defense of this "let go" view of abiding, its champions were probably often reacting to legalism.
    - i. *Legalism* is a lifestyle defined by *man-made* religious rules drafted to go please God by *my* good works & secure my *salvation*, and which often go *beyond* the commandments of Scripture.
      - 1. So *quietist* writers & teachers recognized the *frustrating errors* of *legalism*, but in response tended to *over-correct*. Like turning your steering wheel *too far* & *too fast* the other way when your car slides on *black ice* (the hard-to-see *black ice* of *legalism*).

- e. To further defend the later *quietists*, such as teachers in the **19**<sup>th</sup> century *Higher Life*, or *Kewick*, *Movement*, they weren't always careful to balance everything they wrote, every place they wrote.
  - i. I.e., they often *knew* better than they (in places) *wrote*.

So if "Let go & let God" is a little unbalanced & unworkable, what did Jesus mean in John 15 & what does the rest of the **NT** have to contribute?

- 1. Let's read v.5 again. Apart from me you can do nothing.
- 2. There are **2 type** of people defined in Jesus' straight-forward statement:
  - a. The *non-abider*, who can *do nothing* of eternal significance.
  - b. The Christ-abider, who bears spiritual fruit.
  - c. We want to be in the second picture!  $\rightarrow$  with Christ, fruitful for Christ.
- 3. But nothing in Jesus' teaching (here, elsewhere in the Gospels) indicates that you lay around in a *spiritual hammock* watching Jesus *whacking all the weeds & watering all the rows* in the *garden*!
- 4. The point is...
  - a. ... not that you & I just chill in the Spirit.
  - b. ...but that we don't simply *rely only on ourselves, our smarts, our strength, our priorities* to live our lives.
    - i. But that we *rely first & daily* on Jesus (Word) in all that we do! (And Jesus *does* use the word "do" in v.5!)
    - ii. It's all about setting ourselves to *depend on Him* as we *do*.

- 5. A good illustration of this, which you can understand as a Bible-believer, is found in the *Doctrine of the Inspiration of Scripture*.
  - a. *Who* wrote the *Gospel of John* the Apostle John, or God?
  - b. In **21:24**, John writes of himself & his account: This is the disciple who is testifying to these things and wrote these things.
  - c. Elsewhere in the **NT** (2 Tm 3:16) All Scripture is **inspired by God** ( $\theta \epsilon o \pi v v \epsilon \pi \tau o \zeta lit. God-breathed).$
  - d. Is it *John* or is it *God*...? You know the answer it's *both*! And that's the *abiding life*: *I* work as *Christ* works *in* & *through* me.
- 6. Rosscup writes: A Christian is fruitful only in the measure that the life of Christ the Vine is flowing into and through his life. Opposition arises between one's personal effort and Christ's effort working through him only if he is struggling to do it in self-sufficient power and wisdom, that of the flesh, w/o truly relying upon Christ.
- 7. Is the abiding life you or is it Him...? Yes! ②

"How do I abide?" That's the question!

- 1. And I want to say, perhaps unnecessarily, that this is a *fundamental call* in understanding the Christian life!
  - a. To abide in Him is really synonymous (w.r.t. key **NT** truths) to walking in Him, following Him, laying down your life on His altar.
  - b. This text, thus, ranks with **Psa 1** How blessed is the man & **Eph 4** walk in manner worthy of your calling & **Mk 4** "Follow Me..." & **Rom 12** I urge you, therefore brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodes a living & holy sacrifice.
  - c. "Abide in Me, and I in you."

## 2. ...how...?

- a. Let's begin by remembering what you asking for, what you *must* ask for: "abide" (verb, action, present tense → lifestyle) remain, live with. You are living with Christ, day by day.
- b. And the result is that as you walk & work, Christ lives & walks & works in you.
  - i. Paul writes, **Phil 2:12-13 (turn & read). One** sentence, **one** huge idea!
  - ii. **V.12** You work...
  - iii. **V.13** *He works in & through* you the outcome is the *fruit of His good pleasure*.
  - iv. That's it! This is the abiding life! This is what you're asking for!
- c. So here is how to begin: *ask* Christ to abide in you. I'm a *big fan* of *asking* God to do the things He calls me to do.
  - i. I don't mean a come to the altar, once & for all & it's finished action; ...
  - *ii.* I mean a daily & conscious *appeal* to Him to strengthen you to remain *aware* & *faithful* to *abide*.
- d. *Depend* on Christ. See Him as your strength...
- e. Then *obey* the commands of abiding.
  - i. **V.7** ...if My words abide in you... (i.e. His commands).
  - ii. The *life of abiding* is lived out in the *Word, prayer* (7), *fellowship, obedience,* & *diligence in the* **NT** *disciplines*.

- f. Finally, *trust* that Jesus will *do* just as He *promises*. This is crucial because you don't always *feel* like you are *abiding* or even immediately see some kind of *tangible* results. *Fruit grows slow!* 
  - i. Scripture teaches that we walk by faith, not by sight (2 Cor 5).
  - ii. If you are seeking to abide, Christ's Spirit will strengthen you to abide! Trust Him!
- g. How do you abide? Ask...depend...obey...trust...repeat daily!

To walk, to follow, to lay down, to abide...

- 1. These are foundational, life-defining concepts of the Christian lifestyle.
- 2. We are called to *do*, but when we do not depend upon His life, all that we do is *vain*, *unfruitful*.
- 3. A life of abiding and bearing fruit will be one of effort. To the degree that we really **depend** upon Christ to live His **vine life** in & through us in all the effort of our lives, **we will be fruitful** (170).

Tonight, as we close in prayer, I want to ask you to spend a moment *alone with Christ* asking Him for the *grace* to *abide in Him* this week (*go back* to Him soon!).
