

A Letter of Grace 2 Corinthians

The Grace of God (8:1-15)

1

The Previous Instruction (1 Corinthians 16:1-4)

Now concerning the collection for the saints:

as I directed the churches of Galatia, so you also are to do.

On the first day of every week,

each of you is to put **something** aside and **store** it up, as he **may prosper**,

so that there will be no collecting when I come.

And when I arrive,

I will send those whom you accredit by letter

to carry your gift to Jerusalem.

If it seems advisable that I should go also, they will **accompany** me.

The Grace of God in Macedonia (vv.1-5)

We want you to know, brothers, about the grace of God that has been given among the churches of Macedonia, for in a severe test of affliction, their abundance of joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. For they gave according to their means, as I can testify, and beyond their means, of their own accord, begging us earnestly for the favor of taking part in the relief of the saints—and this, not as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord and then by the will of God to us.

The Completion of Grace at Corinth (vv.6-8)

Accordingly, we urged **Titus** that as he had started, so he should complete among you this **act of grace**. But as you **excel** in everything

- —in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all earnestness, and in our love for you
 - —see that you excel in this act of grace also.

I say this **not** as a command, but to **prove** by the earnestness of others that your love also is **genuine**.

The Display of Grace in Jesus Christ (v.9)

For you know the **grace** of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet **for your sake** he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich.

The Benefit of Grace to the Corinthians (vv.10-12)

And in this matter I give my judgment:
this benefits you,
who a year ago started not only to do this work
but also to desire to do it.
So now finish doing it as well,
so that your readiness in desiring it
may be matched by your completing it
out of what you have.
For if the readiness is there,
it is acceptable according to what a person has,
not according to what he does not have.

The Distribution of Grace to All (vv.13-15)

For I do not mean that others should be eased and you burdened, but that as a matter of fairness your abundance at the present time should supply their need, so that their abundance may supply your need, that there may be fairness.

As it is written, "Whoever gathered much had nothing left over, and whoever gathered little had no lack."
