When To Keep Silence - When To Speak Be not over much wicked, neither be thou foolish: why shouldest thou die before thy time? (Ecclesiastes 7:17) To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven: A time to keep silence, and a time to speak; Why Develop A, "Code of Silence?" 1. In the multitude of words there wanteth not sin: but he that refraineth his lips is wise. (Proverbs 10:19) A fool's voice is known by multitude of words. 2. (Ecclesiastes 5:3) A fool uttereth all his mind: but a wise man keepeth it in till afterwards. (Proverbs 29:11) The tongue of the wise useth knowledge aright: but the mouth of fools poureth out foolishness. (Proverbs 15:2) A fool also is full of words: a man cannot tell what shall be; and what shall be after him, who can tell him? (Ecclesiastes 10:14) Be not rash with thy mouth, and let not thine heart be hasty to utter any thing before 3. God: for God is in heaven, and thou upon earth: therefore let thy words be few. (Ecclesiastes 5:2) A soft answer turneth away wrath: but grievous words stir up anger. (Proverbs 13:1) There is that speaketh like the piercings of a sword: but the tongue of the wise is health. (Proverbs 12:18) Then are they glad because they be guiet; so 4. he bringeth them unto their desired haven. (Psalm 107:30) Better is a dry morsel, and quietness therewith, than an house full of sacrifices with strife. (Proverbs 17:1) Better is an handful with quietness, than both the hands full with travail and vexation of spirit. (Ecclesiastes 4:6) The words of wise men are heard in quiet more than the cry of him that ruleth among fools. (Ecclesiastes 9:17) And that ye study to be quiet, and to do your own business, and to work with your own hands,



as we commanded you; That ye may walk honestly toward them that are without, and that ye may have lack of nothing. (1 Thesssalonians 4:11-12) Now them that are such we command and exhort by our Lord Jesus Christ, that with quietness they work, and eat their own bread. (2 Thesssalonians 3:12) Death and life are in the power of the tongue: and they that love it shall eat the fruit thereof. (Proverbs 18:21) For thy mouth uttereth thine iniquity, and thou choosest the tongue of the crafty. Thine own mouth condemneth thee, and not I: yea, thine own lips testify against thee. (Job 15:5-6) The tongue deviseth mischiefs; like a sharp razor, working deceitfully. 10. Thou lovest evil more than good; and lying rather than to speak righteousness. Selah. Thou lovest all devouring words, O thou deceitful tongue. (Psalm 52:2-4) The LORD shall cut off all flattering lips, and the tongue that speaketh proud things: 11. Who have said, With our tongue will we prevail; our lips are our own: who is lord over (Psalm 12:3-4) But the tongue can no man tame; it is an unruly evil, full of deadly poison. (James 3:8) Hear; for I will speak of excellent things; and the opening of my lips shall be right things. 12. For my mouth shall speak truth; and wickedness is an abomination to my lips. All the words of my mouth are in righteousness; there is nothing froward or perverse in them. They are all plain to him that understandeth, and right to them that find knowledge.
