# II. God has promised to subject the word to come to the God-man Jesus, not the angels (2:5–9)

- A. Jesus <u>IS</u> the Ruler *as* the Messiah
- B. Made lower than the *angels* or gods?(2:7)
- C. Tension of the already/not yet (2:8)

## III. Jesus redeems mankind by dying for the new humanity (2:10-13)

- A. Angels as intermediators
- B. Jesus as Angel of the Lord
- C. Therefore, Jesus as *both* witness of the law *and* fulfiller of the law
- D. Three ways in which it is fitting that Jesus is the "Founder" of our salvation
  - 1. It is fitting because sanctification for both head and covenant members is through *suffering*
  - 2. It is fitting that having *one* source, the sons of God shall be sons of glory through the same mediator (v. 11)
  - 3. It is fitting that Jesus came to redeem *humans*, not *angels*. Implications

### IV. The Incarnation, therefore, was for mankind, not angels (2:14–18)

- A. Jesus partook of the *same things* (v. 14).
- B. He came to give freedom from the fear of death (v. 15)
- C. He came to help the offspring of Abraham (v. 16)
- D. Because Christ took on flesh, he can sympathize with, understand, and most importantly, *help* those who are being tempted (2:17–18)
