Prov 15:1-7, vv 23 & 28 – "Lips to Glorify Christ"

- A. The Proverbs are designed to give us much-needed wisdom so that we can know how we ought to live.
 - 1. As a whole, this book can be summed-up as the "words of the wise" (1:6).
 - 2. Think about the scope of human activity covered in this book.
- B. Today's text gives contrasts between wise vs. foolish speech.
 - 1. How we act is important; however, how we speak is of equal importance. Both reveal our hearts.
 - 2. As those saved by grace through faith in Christ, we are called to live not for ourselves "but for Him who died & rose again" for us (2 Cor 5:15). We are to "...do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor 10:31).

I. CONTRASTING WISE vs FOOLISH SPEECH

A. What you say matters, but how you say it also matters. **Prov 15:1** "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger."

- 1. This is among the most highly recommended verses for peace in a marriage.
- 2. Respect authorities in the home by how you speak to them.
 - a. Children, a respectful answer turns away wrath, but a disrespectful word stirs up a parent's
 - b. Wives, a respectful answer turns away wrath, but a disrespectful word stirs up a husband's
 - 1) OPC wedding vows "And will you love him, comfort him, respect & submit to him even as the church submits to Christ?" (OPC BCO p.184-185).
 - 2) Wives, when your husband makes a mistake or sins, he still deserves your respect because of your vow to God & because Scripture commands you (Eph 5:22-24).
- 3. Husbands, a gentle answer rather than a commanding or abrasive tone will bring better progress.
 - a. Prov 15:4 "A soothing tongue is a tree of life, but perversion in it crushes the spirit."
 - b. <u>Eph 6:4</u> "Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline & instruction of the Lord." Cruel words can crush a son or daughter's spirit.
- B. Think before speaking.
 - 1. <u>Prov 15:23</u> "A man has joy in an apt answer & how delightful is a timely word!... (v28) The heart of the righteous ponders how to answer, but the mouth of the wicked pours out evil things"
 - a. An "apt answer" is appropriate or suitable to help in your particular situation or need.
 - c. (<u>v28</u>) says the "righteous ponders how to answer"— thinks deeply— about how to answer. Notice the contrast with the wicked & the rash person who "pours out evil things."
 - 2. <u>Prov 25:11-12</u> "Like apples of gold in settings of silver is a word spoken in right circumstances. Like an earring of gold & an ornament of fine gold is a wise reprover to a listening ear."
 - 3. <u>Prov 17:27</u> "He who restrains his words has knowledge, & he who has a cool spirit is a man of understanding. ²⁸ Even a fool, when he keeps silent, is considered wise; when he closes his lips, he is considered prudent." It is not wise to blurt-out the first thing that comes to your mind.
 - b. Prov 18:13: "He who gives an answer before he hears, it is folly and shame to him."
 - c. When a thought comes to your mind, ask yourself such questions before speaking: Is it pleasing to God? Do these words build-up/encourage or tear-down? → turn to Eph 4:29-32
- C. Wise lips brings favor (16:13): "Righteous lips are the delight of kings, & he who speaks right is loved."

 D. A Fool's lips bring him great harm (18:6-7a): "A fool's lips bring strife, & his mouth calls for blows. A fool's mouth is his ruin, & his lips are the snare of his soul."
- E. God calls you to pursue persuasive speech rather than harsh speech that stirs-up strife. \rightarrow **Prov 16:21f**

II. THE LAW AS A SCHOOLMASTER & GUIDE

A. Even after years of God's blessing his ministry, Paul the apostle never felt as though he "arrived" in his fight against sin. Rom 7:13 "...through the commandment sin would become utterly sinful."

- 1. The moral law acts as a schoolmaster to show us our sinfulness & need for God's mercy that can only be found in the Lord Jesus Christ.
 - a. If you are an unbeliever, the law is designed to show you that you are not a good person.
 - b. Believers, the law continue to show you of your ongoing need of Christ.
- 2. The sins of our lips especially show us how our sin is "utterly sinful." \rightarrow Turn to Mat 12:33-37.
 - a. Prov 18:7: "A fool's mouth is his ruin, & his lips are the snare of his soul."
 - b. "Behold, now is the acceptable time, behold, now is the day of salvation" (1 Cor 6:1-2).
 - → Repent while there is yet hope.

B. Even Christians who have a sincere, saving faith in Christ continue to fight against the sins of the flesh. It is a life-long battle. For some of us, sins of our lips can be one of our greatest struggles.

- 1. One of the keys to growing in this area is to keep on fighting.
- 2. Don't give in to the sins of Ur lips. Tonight we will study WCF 14 "Of Saving Faith." Sec 2 says, "By this faith, a Christian believeth to be true whatsoever is revealed in the Word, for the authority of God Himself speaking therein. . . yielding obedience to the commands, trembling at the threatenings, & embracing the promises of God for this life, & that which is to come"
 - a. Christ's warning about giving an account for every careless word ought to cause trembling.
 - b. Yet we are to embrace "the promises of God for this life, & that which is to come."
 - 1) By faith, we believe that Jesus has paid for every careless, vain, & sinful word.
 - 2) Otherwise, we would have absolutely no hope.
- 3. As a Christian, you ought to seek God's grace to transform your speech to honor your Lord Jesus.
 - a. You are not saved by having perfect, sinless speech. If such was required, each one of us would be utterly doomed!
 - b. Still, your calling in life is unto sanctification— to "more & more to die unto sin, & live unto righteousness" (WSC 35).
 - 1) Endeavor to make progress in your speech month by month & year by year.
 - 2) Try to find tactics that works in putting-up a good fight rather than giving-in:
 - a) When something breaks or goes wrong, transform the tendency to curse or take God's name in vain into a sincere prayer. "Oh God help me, I ask ..."
 - b) When tempted to back-bite, try to first put yourself in that person's place 1st& ask yourself whether or not you should talk to that person directly about...
 - c) 1 Cor 15:33 "Do not be deceived: bad company corrupts good morals."
 - → Bad company can corrupt your Christian walk, including your speech.
