Colossians 3:18-4:1 OT: Song of Solomon 8:1-7

Theme: The extraordinary relationship and life we have with the crucified and risen Lord Jesus Christ is exhibited not primarily in spectacular acts of service and accomplishment – but in the redeeming of our most common, ordinary relationships and responsibilities. Christ's glory and grace is seen in the everyday spheres and relationships of the family, work and community.

- I. The Big Surprise
  - A. Offending the "modern" mind
    - 1. Low view of women submission
      - Following the modern cultural norm:
      - 1st Human happiness is based in "independent freedom"
      - 2<sup>nd</sup> You are diminished as a person, inferior to your husband
    - 2. Restraining children's personal development
    - 3. Supporting slavery? (Deuteronomy 24:7)
    - 4. Our moral superiority?
  - B. The real surprise
    - 1. The elevation of the ordinary!
      - a. The Christian life at home
        - This is where it is put to the test
      - b. The gospel life is a "this worldly" affair
    - 2. Our dignity and equality in Christ (Galatians 3:28)
  - 3. Culturally relevant?
    - The issues are not cultural but biblical and distinctly Christian

## II. The Perfect Order

NOTE: Must remember - Greek philosophers regarded the household as the basic unit of the state.

Order there would lead to order in the state.

- A. Wives v. 3:18
  - 1. Submit to your husbands
    - Paul doesn't challenge the legal order
    - Not a "command" but an instruction
    - As distinction in "order" or place not in value
  - 2. The call to "order": James 4:7; Romans 8:7; Ephesians 5:21; Ephesians 5:24; Romans 13:1; 1 Corinthians 16:16; Luke 2:51
  - 3. Fitting in the Lord
    - a. Not because the culture says so, but because God desires it
    - b. A guard against abuse
- B. Husbands v. 3:19
  - 1. Love your wives!
    - Their well-being is in your hands, your responsibility
    - Exercise his love rather than rights
  - 2. "Do not be harsh with them"
    - a. The wife submits to love not harshness.
    - b. Possible translation: "become embittered (or resentful) toward her"

  - Compassion
  - Kindness
