Proverbs 16:27-28 & 17:14 - "Called to be Peaceful"

A. Proverbs is a book of Wisdom— "The words of the wise" to teach us how to live to God's glory.

B. Toda's area of guidance from Proverbs is how to be peaceful.

- 1. The opposite of peace is strife. Heb wd for "strife" can be translated "quarreling" or "arguing."
 - → A huge motivator to avoid strife is found in Prov 18:19 "A brother offended is harder to be won than a strong city, & contentions are like the bars of a citadel."

2. Peace is a God-wrought fruit of the Holy Spirit (Gal 5).

I. HOW TO AVOID STRIFE

A. Be careful how you speak & what you say to avoid strife.

- 1. <u>Prov 16:27-28</u> "A worthless man digs up evil, while his words are like scorching fire. 28A perverse man spreads strife, & a slanderer separates intimate friends."
- 2. The Proverbs tell us we ought to overlook & conceal another's sins when possible:
 - a. It is your "...glory to overlook a transgression" (Prov 19:11b).
 - b. <u>Prov 17:19</u> "He who conceals a transgression seeks love, but he who repeats a matter separates intimate friends."
 - 1) You have not overlooked the another's sin if you keep bringing it up.
 - 2) If the issue keeps coming up, read Mat 18:15-20 & seek to carry it out.
- 3. During your conversations, remember **Prov 15:1: "A gentle answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger."**
- B. Try not to let a conversation about differing opinions turn into an all-out argument.
 - 1. <u>Prov 17:14</u> "The beginning of strife is *like* letting out water, so abandon the quarrel before it breaks out." Imagine a dam with a small leak.

Some practical ways to put water on the smoldering disagreement include:

- a. Let the other person have the last word. You don't always have to be right.
- b. Depending upon if it is a Christian family member or friend, suggest praying.
- c. If either of you get heated, separate yourselves.
- 2. Prov 20:3 "Keeping away from strife is an honor for a man, but any fool will quarrel."

C. Avoid gossip & slander; also avoid those persons who gossip or slander others.

- 1. Prov 17:4 "An evildoer listens to wicked lips; a liar pays attention to a destructive tongue."
- 2. → Turn to **<u>Prov 26:18-26</u>**
- 3. Prov 22:10 "Drive out the scoffer, & contention will go out, even strife & dishonor will cease. \rightarrow Turn to Titus 3:1-11

D. Jesus tells us, **"blessed are the peacemakers"** (Mat 5:9) yet wisdom says we should pray about whether to get involved in the quarrels of others in the first place. Prov 26:17 says "Like one who takes a dog by the ears is he who passes by and meddles with strife not belonging to him."

E. Avoid spreading news in an unnecessary fashion. **Prov 24:28a: "Do not be a witness against your neighbor without cause,..."**

F. Avoid the strife of revenge: Prov 24:29: Do not say, 'Thus I shall do to him as he has done to me;

II. HOW TO HANDLE DISAGREEMENT:

A. Restrain your anger as you discuss your differences even if the other party gets angry.

- 1. Prov 15:18: "A hot-tempered man stirs up strife, but the slow to anger calms a dispute."
- 2. <u>Prov 30:33</u> "For the churning of milk produces butter, & pressing the nose brings forth; blood so the churning of anger produces strife."
- 2. James 1:19-20 "...everyone must be quick to hear, slow to speak and slow to anger; ²⁰ for the anger of man does not achieve the righteousness of God."

B. Be wise & careful when you have a dispute with a neighbor: **Prov 25:8**: **"Do not go out hastily to argue** *your case;* **otherwise, what will you do in the end, when your neighbor humiliates you?**

 \rightarrow This same chapter goes on to say that we ought to settle & keep matters in private. <u>25:9-10:</u> "Argue your case with your neighbor, & do not reveal the secret of another, 10Or he who hears *it* will reproach you,"

C. If you cannot overlook a sin / transgression, Jesus tells you to follow Mat 18:15-20:

<u>Step 1</u>: (v15) "If your brother sins, go & show him his fault in private; if he listens to you, you have won your brother."

- a. If confronted with gentleness rather than harshness, this process may build your bond in Christ.
 - 1) We need others to help us in our growth of sanctification.
 - 2) Prov 27:6a "Faithful are the wounds of a friend,..."
- b. If he apologizes to you & you settle the matter, what need is there to tell others?
- c. The majority of problems can & should be handled with step 1 of Mat 18.

Step 2: (v16) "But if he does not listen to you, take 1 or 2 more with you, so that by the mouth of 2 or 3 witnesses every fact may be confirmed."

<u>Step 3</u>: (v17) "If he refuses to listen to them, tell it to the church…" →Steps 2 & 3 Combined involve the wisdom & frequent success of many counselors (<u>Prov 15:22</u>)

D. If your opponent dishes-out insults or anger, patiently defend yourself while being kind & giving to him or her. <u>Prov 25:21</u>: "If your enemy is hungry, give him food to eat; & if he is thirsty, give him water to drink; ²² For you will heap burning coals on his head, & the Lord will reward you."

E. Some disputes can be handled with the toss of a coin or some dice.

1. <u>Prov 16:33</u>: "The lot is cast into the lap, but its every decision is from the Lord."

2. <u>Prov 18:18:</u> The *cast* lot puts an end to strife & decides between the mighty ones.

a. This works especially well with kids as well as with the mighty.

b. In <u>Acts 1:26</u>, Matthias was selected by prayer followed by the drawing of lots.
