David, the true king of Israel, is now on the run from Saul, the rejected "king" who still clings to power. Yet despite all the plots and schemes to kill David, he is supernaturally preserved. We'll explore these deliverances today and ask what they mean for us.

## The Big Picture of 1 Samuel

"The overall story of the Bible is how God worked out a plan to save the human race from sin and death. In the OT, this plan was nearly identical with the national history of God's chosen nation of Israel. First Samuel recounts the history of Israel at a very crucial stage of its existence. The crucial development in the nation was its unwillingness to have God as its only king. As we observe this phase of Israelite history, we are led to ponder what kind of rule we need and to conclude that only the eventual Son of *David, Christ, is sufficient."*—The Literary Study Bible, ESV
