Introducing Mark..

- John Mark, a friend of the apostle Peter
- 140 A.D. Papias:

"Mark having become the interpreter of Peter, wrote down accurately all that he remember of the things said and done by our Lord, but not, however, in order."

• "The Gospel according to Peter"

• The word Gospel means "news", not "teaching" or "record"

• There is an inscription of a royal "evangel": 'The beginning of the gospel of Caesar Augustus"

• Emperors sent heralds to announce the good news about their kingdom's strength or inauguration

- Christians chose "evangelion" (gospel) to express the essence of their faith. Instead of:
 - Illumination (photismos)
 - Knowledge (gnosis)
 - Teaching (didache)
 - Wisdom (sophia)

Communicates:

 1. News about what God has already done for you (and me) rather than instruction and advice about what we are to do for God.

2. The gospel has a public character

William Brownson:

"It identifies Christian faith as news that has significance for all people, indeed for the whole world, not merely as esoteric understanding or insight."

If Jesus is not alive right now, Christianity too, is "dead"

What a gospel is not:

- Not instruction
- Not biography
- Although historical, not history
- Not legend or myth

Mark is the earliest of the four gospels (Matthew, Luke, John)

Written about 25-30 years before 70 A.D.

• Implication 1: Mark had abundant sources for producing an accurate account instead of relying on legends handed down or unverifiable

• Implication 2: Very difficult for Mark to fabricate accounts.
