I. Introduction and review.

II. Joab again rescues David. v. 1-8a

- A. David grieves excessively over Absalom. v. 1-4 18:33
 - 1. David's loyal followers, who had risked their lives for him, feel humiliated. v. 1-3
 - 2. David is paralyzed by sorrow and thus neglects his duty. 18:33 19:4
- B. Joab rebukes David. v. 5-8a
 - 1. Though Joab's methods are questionable, he is loyal and does what is necessary to preserve David's throne.
 - 2. David is guilty of loving those who hate him and hating those who love him. v. 5-6
 - 3. David must reach out to his people or he will lose his kingdom, doing to himself what Absalom failed to do. v. 7
 - 4. David, to his credit, heeds Joab's counsel and receives the people. v. 8a
- C. How are you at giving and receiving rebuke? Prov. 9:7-9
 - 1. We, like Joab, have the duty to rebuke brothers who fall into sin. Mt. 18:15ff Gal. 6:1 James 5:20
 - 2. Do you listen humbly to admonition, even if it is not perfectly delivered? Pr. 27:6 29:1 15:12 1:24ff 10:8
- D. How should we mourn?
 - 1. The loss of a loved one is legitimate occasion for grief. Ecc. 3:47:2 John 11:35
 - 2. When a believer dies, our mourning is tempered by hope. I Th. 4:13ff Phil. 1:21ff
 - 3. Grief is compounded when we fear that our beloved died in unbelief.
 - 4. We must, however, submit to God's sovereign will and His justice. Lev. 10:1ff
 - a. When Job's children died he did not blame God. Job 1:18-22
 - b. When Aaron's sons died he kept silent. Lev. 10:3
 - c. Absalom died under God's judgment. 17:14 Ex. 20:12 Pr. 30:17 20:20
 - d. We cannot take our child's side against God.
 - e. Trust God that He does what is just and right.
 - f. When we are perfectly sanctified, we will understand.
 - 5. God desires to show mercy to the wayward. They have no-one other than themselves to blame for their calamity. Ezek. 33:11
 - 6. We cannot let our grief keep us from our kingdom duty.
- E. How does this passage point us to Christ?
 - 1. Jesus pursued His Father's Kingdom work without distraction. John 4:34 17:4
 - 2. We must put Christ's kingdom even above our families. Luke 14:26 9:59-62 I Sam. 2:29
 - 3. Jesus is enough to satisfy our souls even when people fail us. Jer. 17:5-8
 - 4. One day Jesus will wipe every tear away. Rev. 21:4 Isa. 25:8

III. David is restored as king. v. 8b-15

- A. The aftermath of a civil war is complex as a divided nation must be healed.
- B. The Northern tribes take initiative to restore David as king. v. 8b-10 5:1ff
 - 1. They recall David's past exploits. v. 9
 - 2. If David was so great, why did they follow Absalom? Acts 17:51-52,27,35-37

- 3. People are still very fickle when it comes to their leaders.
- 4. Those of us who lead must seek to please God and not men. Pr. 29:25 I Th. 2:4
- C. David seeks to rally the support of his tribe, Judah. v. 11-14
 - 1. Though David has won the war, he seeks the consent of those he will govern.
 - 2. He enlists the support of the priests. v. 11-12
 - 3. He appoints Absalom's general Amasa (who also is a cousin) to replace Joab as the commander of the army. v. 13 17:25
 - 4. Why would David elevate a traitor? 17:25 18:5,14 20:9
 - 5. The hearts of Judah are with David as they seek his return. v. 14-15
- D. These tensions between Judah and the Northern tribes foreshadow future divisions in Israel. v. 40-43
 - 1. The end of Absalom's conspiracy is not the end of David's troubles.
 - 2. The men of Judah quarrel those from the other tribes of Israel. v. 41-43
 - 3. Why are only half of the people of Israel accompanying David? v. 40
 - 4. David seems play on these divisions. v. 11
 - 5. The divisions between North and South soon cause further trouble. 20:1ff
 - 6. The consequences of David's great sin will continue beyond his own life when the kingdom is permanently divided. I Ki. 12
 - 7. Is this a picture of divisions in Christ's church? Gal. 5:15 I Co. 1:10ff Js. 4:1-2
- E. The treatment of David by the people is like the treatment of the Lord by humanity.
 - 1. Our representative Adam rejected God as king and enthroned Satan. Gen. 3:1ff II Co. 4:4
 - 2. When Jesus came into the world, most rejected Him. John 1:10-11
 - 3. God's Anointed, Jesus the Son of David, has come and defeated Satan. Gen. 3:15 Lu. 10:18 Ro. 16:20 I John 3:8
 - 4. He seeks willing subjects. Luke 19:10 Mt. 11:28ff John 7:37ff
 - 5. Will you invite Jesus to reign over your life? Luke 19:14 John 1:12-13
- F. Some believers have wandered from Christ. Rev. 2:4ff
