Evening Devotion Outline

The whole Lord's Day is to be a day of worship and praise to God. This evening devotion is a great way to close out the Lord's Day by reflecting on God's word and works through Christ. Begin with reading the opening Scriptures. Pray the Lord's Prayer together and sing a Psalm or hymn. Have someone read the passage of Scripture (taken from the "first reading" of the morning service). Once you listen to the devotion, reflect with a few (or all) of the questions for reflection and close with singing and prayer.

All Scripture is quoted from the English Standard Version.

Opening Scripture Psalm 84:1–4

- ¹ How lovely is your dwelling place, O LORD of hosts!
- ² My soul longs, yes, faints for the courts of the LORD; my heart and flesh sing for joy to the living God.
- ³ Even the sparrow finds a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may lay her young, at your altars, O LORD of hosts, my King and my God.
- ⁴ Blessed are those who dwell in your house, ever singing your praise!

Point: Christian hospitality is a commendable, faithful, and good way to walk in the truth of Christ and his Gospel.

- 2. How has verse 2 been used in ungodly ways by those who hold to a "prosperity gospel"?
- 3. What brings John the greatest joy as a pastor?
- 4. How may hospitality serve the Great Commission?
- 5. How does John show a bold and humble heart as he speaks about the evil that Diotrephes has done?
- 6. What does not seeing God (v. 11) have to do with doing evil?
- 7. Why do you think we are so often ready to return evil for evil? What does this teach us about our need for Christ?
- 8. List some of the ways you long for greater peace in your life. Then go back through 3rd John (As well as 1st and 2nd John) to see how John points you to Christ, his Gospel, and the church as sources of peace for our Christian walk.
