Message #40 Proverbs 13:1-6

The book of Proverbs is devoted to God's communicable attribute—wisdom. Thirty-one chapters, 915 verses all devoted to expounding God's wisdom to finite man... The first nine chapters are called the "My son" section. Beginning at chapter 10 (10:1-22:16), we have the first "proverbs of Solomon" section. In this section, Solomon gives a series of one verse maxims, using anti-thetic parallelism to contrast a wise way of life with a foolish way of life.

A WISE, RIGHTEOUS WAY OF LIFE IS COMPLETELY THE <u>OPPOSITE</u> OF A FOOLISH, UNRIGHTEOUS WAY OF LIFE, AND THOSE WHO PURSUE WISDOM WILL NEVER REGRET IT.

CONTRAST #1 – One's response to <u>corrective</u> instruction determines how wise a person. **13:1**

To state the proverb simply, a wise person will listen to and obey corrective instruction, but a foolish scoffer will not. The "scoffer" is one who mocks or derides God and parents and will not listen to or obey a rebuke.

(**Observation #1**) - Corrective instruction and discipline is <u>needed</u> to produce wisdom.

(**Observation #2**) - Corrective instruction and discipline will not be heard by all people.

CONTRAST #2 – The use of <u>speech</u> determines what God will allow to happen in the future. 13:2

The proverb says whatever a man is saying he will ultimately end up receiving. Good speech reaps good things. A fraudulent, treacherous person will reap violence.

CONTRAST #3 – The control of speech determines prosperity or ruin. **13:3**

Someone very wisely said, "I have often been sorry I spoke, but never sorry I kept silent." The words of James are very important—everyone must be "quick to hear, slow to speak" (James 1:19).

CONTRAST #4 – The attitude toward work determines emptiness or abundance. **13:4**

A sluggard, in Solomon's mind, was a stupid, foolish person (Prov. 6:6-11; 12:24, 27). The word means he is a person of neglect. The thing the sluggard neglects is work. Robert Alden well said, "Wishful thinking will never replace hard work."

CONTRAST #5 – The attitude toward deceit determines righteousness or wickedness. 13:5

The word "hate" means to hate in the sense of hating an enemy. The word "falsehood" refers to any coloring of truth, any deceitfulness. A wise man considers any distortion of truth to be his enemy.

CONTRAST #6 – Our righteousness determines our outcome. 13:6

Righteous people are wise people that are guarded. The one who does not conform to the righteous standards of God will be overthrown by his own wicked ways.
